The Role of Quartal Harmony

Unlike tertiary harmony (chords built in thirds), **quartal harmony** (chords built in fourths) provides a more open, ambiguous sound. In *A Smooth Jazz Christmas*, quartal voicings are utilized to bridge the gap between melodic phrases, allowing the pianist to maintain a sense of forward motion without the heavy gravity of traditional dominant-to-tonic resolutions.

- Offertory: The slightly more rhythmic and complex pieces work well during the collection of tithes, providing an engaging but non-distracting background that maintains the service's momentum.
- Postlude (Quiet): While postludes are often loud and boisterous, a smooth jazz arrangement can be highly effective for candlelight services or Christmas Eve late-night liturgies.

Step-by-Step Guide to Practicing Advanced Jazz Arrangements

Approaching an advanced score like **FJH1401** requires a systematic method to ensure both technical accuracy and stylistic authenticity. Use the following procedure to master the arrangements:

Step 1: Harmonic Reduction

Before attempting to play the piece with all its flourishes, analyze the chord progression. Identify the underlying **ii-V-I progressions** and secondary dominants. Understanding the "harmonic skeleton" allows the pianist to play with more confidence and intent.

Step 2: Isolate the Left-Hand Groove
