4. Media Adaptation: From Literature to Cinematography

The adaptation of "Pelle zieht aus" into film, notably directed by **Johanna Hald**, requires a technical shift from internal monologue to visual storytelling. In the book, Pelle's feelings are conveyed through prose; in the film, they must be communicated through **mise-en-scène** and cinematography.
