The starter motor in a BMW E90 is a specialized **Direct Current (DC) motor** designed to provide the initial torque necessary to rotate the internal combustion engine (ICE) until it reaches a self-sustaining speed. This process involves overcoming the static friction of the engine's internal components and the resistance of the compression strokes within the cylinders.

The Solenoid Mechanism

The solenoid serves a dual purpose: it acts as a high-current relay and a mechanical actuator. When the driver presses the 'Start' button, the **CAS** sends a low-current signal to the solenoid. This creates a magnetic field that pulls a plunger inward. This plunger does two things: it closes the heavy-duty electrical contacts that connect the battery directly to the starter motor, and it simultaneously pushes the **Bendix drive** (the starter gear) into engagement with the **flywheel** or **flexplate** of the engine.

Planetary Gear Reduction

Modern BMW starters, such as those manufactured by **Bosch** or **Magneti Marelli**, typically utilize a planetary gear reduction system. Unlike older direct-drive starters, gear reduction allows a smaller, higher-speed motor to produce the massive torque required to turn over a high-compression engine like the 2.5L inline-six found in the 325i. This reduction ratio (often around 4:1) ensures that the motor can operate efficiently even under cold-start conditions where oil viscosity is high.

Technical Analysis: Engineering Challenges and Component Location

One of the most significant challenges for technicians working on the BMW E90 is the physical location of the starter motor. Unlike many longitudinal engine layouts where the starter is accessible from beneath the vehicle, the E90's starter is situated on the **intake side of the engine block**, tucked underneath the **intake manifold**.

Accessibility Constraints

In the **BMW 320i (N46 engine)** and the **325i (N52 engine)**, the intake manifold completely obscures the starter motor. This design choice was likely driven by the need to protect the starter from road debris and heat radiation from the exhaust manifold. However, it necessitates a "top-down" approach for replacement, requiring the removal of the entire air intake tract, the cabin filter housing, and the manifold itself. Diagnostics: Identifying Starter Failure Modes

Diagnosing a faulty starter in a BMW E90 requires distinguishing between electrical supply issues, signal failures, and internal mechanical collapse. Because the E90 uses a smart charging system and an **Intelligent Battery Sensor (IBS)**, a "no-start" condition is not always indicative of a dead starter motor.

Common Failure Symptoms

- **The Single Click:** A sharp metallic click usually indicates that the solenoid is engaging, but the motor's internal brushes or windings are failed, or there is insufficient current to rotate the armature.
- **The High-Pitched Whine:** This suggests the motor is spinning, but the Bendix drive has failed to extend and engage the flywheel.
- **Slow Cranking:** Often mistaken for a weak battery, internal resistance within an aging starter can lead to a "labored" crank, even with a fully charged 12V source.
- **Intermittent Starting:** Heat soak is a common factor; a starter may work when the engine is cold but fail to engage once the engine bay reaches operating temperature due to internal expansion and resistance.

Electrical Testing Procedures

1. **Voltage Drop Test:** Measure the voltage at the starter terminal while cranking. A drop below 9.6V usually indicates a battery or wiring issue rather than the starter itself.
2. **Ground Strap Inspection:** The BMW E90 is notorious for corroded engine ground straps. If the engine block is not properly grounded to the chassis, the starter will not receive the necessary amperage to turn.
3. **CAS Signal Verification:** Using a diagnostic tool like ISTA/D, technicians should verify that the CAS is sending the "Terminal 50" signal to the starter. If this signal is missing, the issue lies in the security system or the ignition switch, not the motor.

Procedural Implementation: Step-by-Step Replacement Guide

Replacing the starter motor on an E90 (specifically the N52 engine) is a labor-intensive process that requires precision. One critical detail often missed by DIY mechanics is the use of **Aluminum Bolts**. BMW uses magnesium-aluminum alloy engine blocks in many E90s; because these bolts are torque-to-yield (stretch bolts), they **must be replaced** and never reused.

Phase 1: Preparation and Disassembly

- **Battery Disconnection:** You must disconnect the negative terminal in the trunk. The starter cable is unfused and connected directly to the battery; a short circuit during removal can cause a fire or fry the DME.
- **Cowl Removal:** Remove the cabin microfilter housing and the plastic cowl to gain access to the rear of the

engine.

- Intake Manifold Removal: Disconnect the Throttle Body, the DISA valves (if equipped), and the PCV breather hoses. Carefully unbolt the manifold from the cylinder head.

Phase 2: Starter Extraction

1. Once the manifold is moved aside, locate the starter at the rear of the engine block, near the transmission bell housing.

2. Remove the 13mm nut securing the main B+ power cable and the 10mm nut for the solenoid signal wire.

3. Using a long extension and an E-Torx socket (usually E12 or E14), remove the two mounting bolts.

Accessing the rear bolt often requires reaching around the back of the engine by feel.

Phase 3: Reinstallation and Torque Specs

Install the new starter (Bosch is the recommended OEM). It is imperative to follow the specific torque sequence for the new aluminum bolts:

M10 Aluminum Bolt	20 Nm	90 Degrees
M12 Aluminum Bolt	30 Nm	180 Degrees

To maximize the longevity of the starter and the overall electrical system, owners should ensure that the **Alternator** is charging at the correct voltage (typically 14.2V to 14.8V) and that the battery is registered to the car's computer. An unregistered battery can lead to improper charging profiles, which eventually puts unnecessary strain on the starter's solenoid during low-voltage attempts.

Furthermore, when replacing the starter, it is highly recommended to replace the **intake manifold gaskets** and inspect the **crankcase ventilation (PCV)** hoses. Since these components must be removed to access the starter, replacing them proactively prevents future vacuum leaks—a common source of rough idling and "Check Engine" lights in the E90 320i and 325i.
