Consideration	The "You" attitude; focusing on the receiver's perspective and needs.	Builds rapport and increases the likelihood of a positive response.
Concreteness	Use of specific facts, figures, and data rather than vague generalizations.	Enhances credibility and prevents misinterpretation of goals.
Clarity	Use of precise, familiar words and effective sentence structures.	Ensures the message is understood on the first reading.
Courtesy	Professional tone that shows respect for the receiver.	Maintains organizational relationships and brand reputation.
Correctness	Accuracy in grammar, punctuation, and factual data.	Prevents legal errors and maintains technical authority.

4. Typologies of Business Communication

Communication within a corporate structure flows in various directions, each serving a distinct strategic purpose. Understanding these flows is vital for navigating organizational hierarchies.

Internal Upward Communication

This flow originates from subordinates and moves toward management. It is essential for **feedback loops**, reporting progress, and highlighting operational bottlenecks. Common forms include performance reports, suggestion boxes, and grievance procedures.

Internal Downward Communication

5. Barriers to Effective Business Communication

Barriers are technical or psychological points of failure in the communication cycle. Identifying these early is crucial

for maintaining operational integrity.

Physical and Environmental Barriers

- Time and Distance: As highlighted in the Semester I Notes, distance creates logistical challenges, while time zone differences create temporal gaps in feedback.

Semantic and Linguistic Barriers

The SQ3R Method for Business Reading

In the digital era, etiquette has evolved into "Netiquette." This involves specific protocols for invitations, thank-you notes, and professional greetings. The technical goal of etiquette is to minimize friction in professional interactions.

- **Invitations:** Must include the Purpose, Date, Time, Venue (or link), and RSVP deadline.
- **Thank-You Notes:** Should be sent within 24 hours of a meeting to reinforce key takeaways and build rapport.
- **Email Greetings:** Must reflect the hierarchical relationship between the sender and receiver, maintaining a professional distance unless otherwise established.
