The surgical solution for CTS is a **Carpal Tunnel Release** , which involves the longitudinal incision of the flexor retinaculum. An anatomical understanding of the **Recurrent Branch of the Median Nerve**(the "Million Dollar Nerve") is critical here; if this nerve is severed during surgery, the patient loses thumb apposition, a catastrophic functional failure.

**Imaging and Modern Anatomy**
