

The Anatomy of Juvenalian Satire: A Technical Analysis of Jonathan Swift's *A Modest Proposal* and Major Works

In the history of English literature, few figures command as much respect and scrutiny as **Jonathan Swift** (1667–1745). Swift refers to children as "dropped from their dam" and uses terms like "carcass," "shambles," and "breeders" to reduce human beings to livestock.

Structural Breakdown: The Aristotelian Rhetorical Model

Despite its shocking content, "A Modest Proposal" is structured with the precision of a classical **Aristotelian oration**. Swift uses this formal structure to mirror the academic and political documents of his time, thereby heightening the parody of cold rationalism.

The brilliance of Swift's satire lies in its **mathematical rigorousness**. The Proposer performs a detailed cost-benefit analysis that treats human life as a commodity. This section breaks down the pseudo-economic logic presented in the text.

The Population Metric

The Proposer calculates that there are approximately **1.5 million** people in Ireland. From this, he subtracts those who can support their children, leaving a surplus of 120,000 children born annually to poor parents. 3. Increase in National Capital: The circular economy would be stimulated by a new domestic product, reducing

the need for imports.

4. Maintenance Relief: The public would be freed from the cost of maintaining thousands of children after their first year.

5. Culinary Innovation: The proposal suggests that this new meat would bring "great custom to taverns" and appeal to refined palates.

6. Incentivizing Marriage and Parental Care: Ironically, the Proposer argues that parents would treat their children better if they knew they had a market value, and men would stop beating their pregnant wives for fear of "miscarriage."

Comparative Evaluation: Swift's Satirical Spectrum

While "A Modest Proposal" is his most concentrated work, Swift's other satires utilize different technical approaches to critique society and human nature. The following table compares his major works.
