5. Learner Empowerment and Autonomy

As noted by **M. Damayanti (2022)**, the success of mastering a foreign language depends heavily on the learner's autonomous ability. PBA facilitates this by creating environments where students take initiative, participate actively, and engage with the language outside of the formal classroom setting.

6. Community and Stakeholder Engagement

Successful ELT programs are those that have the support of the broader community. This principle involves aligning classroom outcomes with the needs of parents, employers, and local government bodies, ensuring the sustainability of the educational initiative.

Comparative Analysis: Traditional Methods vs. Principles-Based Approach

To better understand the technical superiority of PBA, we can compare it across several key instructional dimensions.
